The Wright Connection Greetings Church Family,

Just saying the word November gives me hope for cooler weather. Fall is upon us, and it can't come soon enough. A few days of heat are certainly a bearable thing, but record highs cause pain, and record-long heat waves upgrade to suffering, and they are likely what inspired Mr. Dante to write his *Inferno*. Sometimes it is not the difficulty of a life situation that is tough; rather, it is the **duration** of that situation. Most of us are pretty good at enduring unpleasant things for a bit, but when there is no end in sight, then what might

be categorized as simple pain (body) can turn into more complex suffering (body and soul). I am so thankful that the Bible does not shy away from this topic. In a study of Psalms, you will find David, a man with extraordinary faith, melting, not under the crush of pain, or the prospect of battle, but under the burden of waiting for God to act. David cries out so many times, "How long, oh Lord?" He bargains and cajoles, trying to get Yahweh to act now: "Wake up!" he shouts to the heavens, "save me!" Noah waits many years for the flood to come and then for the waters to recede. Abraham waits many, many years for God's promise. The children of Israel suffer enslavement in Egypt for centuries, and then embark on a trip to the promised land that should take weeks—it takes 40 years. Waiting on God is not always easy.

Of all the stories we read in scripture, none speak to me more than the story capturing a whole chapter of Acts, telling us about Paul being lost at sea, shipwrecked, and snake bit. Seriously, the book of Acts moves like wildfire as Luke documents the spread of the gospel and the ministries of Peter and Paul. Yet he dedicates a great chunk of papyrus to capturing the shipwreck narrative. Why? Perhaps it is because it captures again the question addressed by Job and his contemporaries. Why do bad things happen and when will they end? If God is in control, if Christ is with us, why are we lost at sea, why is the boat sinking, why do we get snake bit? When will the heat and drought be over? Does God hear our prayers, or is He asleep or busy?

The scene: Paul, Luke, and their entourage are lost at sea on a Roman ship for two weeks, helpless, eventually hopeless. Luke writes: "When neither sun nor stars appeared for many days and the storm continued raging, we finally gave up all hope of being saved" (Acts 27:20). That sure hit me as a shocking statement. These pillars of the faith, Paul and Luke, rode this storm to the point of hopelessness. This is precisely the time Paul is visited by an angel instructing them to hold on, telling them that God was in control, that no one would lose their life, and that all would be spared.


Well, if you were to ask the apostle Paul these tough questions, he would no doubt say that he was never separated from the love of God for even a second (Romans 8:31). He would say that God took all those life situations and wove them into a beautiful tapestry of life and faith (Romans 8:28). He would say that in Christ we are more than conquerors (Romans 8:37). And in the suffering and the waiting, something beautiful grows. He would say that God's grace is sufficient, all-sufficient for our journeys, even when they end with a shipwreck and snake bite. This apostle, having traded a life of ease and prestige for the privilege of suffering for Christ, said, "I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us" (Romans 8:18).

Christ is in the boat. Call on Him. The Prince of Peace is also Lord of your Storm.



One song that has resonated with me this year is "Gratitude" written by Brandon Lake. Within its lyrics, there is a profound sense of worship, where surrender takes center stage. Possessing a heart filled with gratitude naturally leads to releasing life's worries, fears, and uncertainties to God and trusting His sovereignty. We might not always comprehend His plan or motives, but we can rest assured in His goodness through it all.

The song opens with these words: "All my words fall short
I got nothing new
How could I express
All my gratitude?"

Truly, words can hardly express just how good God is. I recently shared with some fellow pastors my disdain for the word "hype" when used in the context of church and worship. "Hype" tends to exaggerate or elevate something beyond what its value or worth is. Yet, attempting to "hype" anything involving God proves impossible, for God's goodness remains. God continues to show us and reveal His character and we see that

goodness continually, but He cannot be hyped. He is worthy of all praise, all honor, all glory. We cannot out-praise or elevate Him beyond how great He is. Therefore, contemplating these lyrics, I'm reminded of the inadequacy of my words in conveying just how great God is and the depth of my gratitude for His unwavering kindness and mercy towards me.

The song's chorus later exclaims:
"So I throw up my hands
Praise You again and again
'Cause all that I have is a hallelujah,
Hallelujah
And I know it's not much
But I've nothing else fit for a King
Except for a heart singing hallelujah,
Hallelujah"

Have you ever felt utterly drained and weary? Perhaps you find yourself in that place now. Take comfort, my friend, for you are not alone. What's truly extraordinary about the Lord is His innate understanding—He knows your heart. Thus, if all that remains within you is a heartfelt hallelujah, it is enough. At times, life's demands can deplete our strength, making it challenging to respond as we'd wish. Yet, offering a heart brimming with praise is the most fitting response we can offer to Him.

Musings from Matthew

Full or Broken, Consorts Are a Blessing

Last month, a new ensemble called the "Trinity United Wind Consort" was formed. This group was formed to introduce a new, unique dynamic to the musical life of the church. Speaking in a general sense, when one thinks about "normal" instruments used in church music, some instruments that come to mind are the organ, the piano, and the guitar in more contemporary settings. Even in larger churches, their music ministries extend into either orchestras or bands when they reach a large enough size. From my experience, not much is attempted with wind ensembles despite its prominence in the American school systems.

Several people approached me and asked why I chose to label the group as a "consort" rather than something more linguistically common. I could simply say that I like how the name sounded and leave it at that. There is, however, more to this name and I hope that I can share some background on why I used the word consort.

A consort can be defined as "a group of instruments, either all of one type, or of different types," and is a term that emerged in England during the 1500s. Written sheet music for instrumental ensembles was a rather new concept during that time, due to the practice of it being predominately improvisatory pre-1450. Despite now having written music, composers of this time period still did not frequently dictate what instrument plays what part, because most wind and

string instruments were made in families. In this system, a single instrument would be constructed in different sizes to cover different ranges of pitches, like the vocal divisions in a choir. Originally, a consort was defined to specifically for a single instrument family (originally called a "full" consort), but mixed ensembles ("broken" consorts) became popular later in the century. The name, in my opinion, has the connotations of an ensemble that is more focused on the art of instrumental music, while giving it a unique identity that connects it to ensembles of the early modern Church. Of course, I also think it sounds better than something plain like "Trinity United Instrumental Ensemble."

If you are reading this and have a desire to play in the consort, please reach out to me. In closing, I would like to point out a passage from Coverdale's translation of Psalm 98:7: "With trompettes also and shawmes: O shewe youre selues ioyfull before the LORDE the kynge."



Moment for Mission

In prior Trumpet articles I gave updates on our Trinity United supported international, national, and local missions. This month we'll focus on five local mission outreaches originating at our church location. We are able to support these outreaches in our missions budget through your generous giving and prayers. Each one brings Jesus' love to local people in tangible ways, encouraging and uplifting them while pointing to the Lord.

Emergency Relief fund: We have a substantial fund in the mission budget for helping both our parishioners and our neighbors who make their needs known to Rebecca Duque, our administrator. People often run short of money for gas, food, or lodging because of temporary setbacks, such as being out of work or having an unexpected expense like a car repair. This is an opportunity to encourage them and also point them towards a growing faith.

MOPS and MOMSnext: This group serves mothers of preschool and school-age kids by providing Christian community. They meet at Trinity United on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday evenings of the month. We provide hot meals and a program for each meeting. A number of Trinity United ladies serve as mentor moms and other facilitators for this important outreach to the community.

This is led by Jenny Currie and Julie Anderson.

Trinity United Youth Missions: The Trinity United Youth Missions fund has funded, most recently, Destiny's ServeHope local missions projects, and also youth mission trips and students to go to Guatemala. This is led by Destiny Robles.

Trinity Preschool: This preschool program serves approximately 100 kids with care available Monday through Friday. The staff, led by Cassi Torrez, helps many of Modesto's parents with excellent child care and gives their kids a loving Christian environment every day.

Trinity United funds for Outreach, Evangelism, and Communication/Promotion: These funds support a wide variety of needs. For instance, we were able to meet two requests from Garrison School's principal, Nancy Matthews this past year. One was for funds to buy a number of sleeping bags to be used by kids going to outdoor camp. Garrison serves a number of families that are either without housing or are barely housed (e.g.: temporarily living with relatives or friends but having no long-term housing in sight).

Another was for funds to construct three large, raised planters for the principal's new garden club. We bought the lumber then built the planters on our LOVE Modesto workday in April. Giving their kids the opportunity to go to camp or be in the garden club could be life-changing!




